**SUBJECT:** Recommendations for How to Proceed with Elective Surgeries for Patients

Whose COVID-19 Screening Test Results are Positive

Following are recommendations for physicians on how to manage patients with elective surgeries when their pre-procedural screening tests come back positive for COVID-19 or they get ill with symptoms prior to their scheduled elective surgery.

- 1. Cancel the patient's surgery.
- 2. The patient needs to achieve the following clearance criteria:
  - a. At least 10 days have passed from positive test or first symptoms.
  - b. Fever free for at least 24 hours without antipyretics.
  - c. Improving clinical condition.
  - d. Criteria for severely immunocompromised are the same with a 20-day period from onset.
- Conduct an assessment to include the urgency of surgery, complexity of surgery, and residual symptoms of COVID (if any) in order to make a clinical decision of timing of rescheduled surgery. Ideally, you would wait at least 30 days to reschedule a non-urgent procedure.
- 4. Do not do pre-procedural screening test unless 3 months have passed from the initial positive as it is possible to continue to have a residual positive test after clearance.
- 5. Inform the OR leadership and anesthesia about the situation when rescheduling is done
- 6. The patient would be managed as non-infected, non-PUI for their surgery.
